The Raymond R. Andy Guest Jr. Shenandoah River State Park is located just downstream from Bentonville. These waters eventually flow into the Chesapeake Bay. The park is 1,604 acres with 5.6 miles of river frontage along the south fork of the Shenandoah River. The rolling, mountainous land features steep slopes and is mostly wooded. In addition to meandering river frontage, the park offers scenic vistas overlooking Massanutten Mountain to the west and Shenandoah National Park to the east.

Wildlife you are likely to see during your visit may include black bears, wild turkeys, white-tailed deer, raccoons, foxes, beavers and skunks. In addition, there are many types of birds, insects, snakes, trees and plants.

River Right Campground (tents only, year-round)

We have reserved five of the ten standard tent walk-in sites, each with a picnic table and fire ring. The sites are less than 50 yards from the parking lot. The campground has a full service bathhouse. Potable water is available near the two vault toilets, and gray water sinks are near the bathhouse and the vault toilets by the parking lot. There are two river-access points, and there is parking for up to 21 vehicles.

Hiking

The park has over 23 miles of trails, 6 of which are multi use; catering to hikers, bikers, and horseback riders. We have several options for the Saturday morning hike (see attached).

Winter Weekend Car Camping Checklist:

- Note: This list is in addition to clothes worn to campout.
Wear your Class A Scout uniform for travel.
- Remember: "Cotton Kills" & "Always pack for one season *colder* than now."

Shelter:

- Backpack or duffle bag (lined w/plastic bag to keep contents dry)
- Tent & plastic footprint for under tent
- Sleeping bag (prefer a hood, but must have top draw cord) & extra blanket
- 2 sleeping pads or a pad and a blanket
- Pillow case (may fill with a jacket)

Clothes:

- Winter coat & winter pants
- 2 Warm caps (1 for sleeping)
- Warm gloves & extra mittens/gloves (1 for sleeping)
- Class B shirt
- Class B fleece or vest
- 2 Underwear
- Long underwear, top & bottom
- 2 pair wool or winter socks (one clean, dry pair for sleeping)
- Insulated winter boots
- Plastic bag for boots in sleeping bag
- Shower flip flops (*if* there are showers)
- Towel (to wrap hot water bottle in sleeping bag)


Safety, Kitchen, & Toiletry:

- Personal 1st Aid Kit (BSA Handbook p. 289)
- Mess kit (bowl, plate, cup, fork, spoon)
- Water bottle, filled and placed in the middle of pack so does not easily freeze
- Pen/pencil & pocket-sized notepad
- Scout Handbook
- Book for reading
- Matches (provided you have earned Firem'n Chit)
- Whistle on neck lanyard
- Compass with a base plate
- Toiletry kit (hand soap, toothbrush, toothpaste, floss, comb, small towel)
- Toilet paper (half a roll in a Zip-Lock bag)
- Sunscreen
- Pocketknife, less than 3" blade (provided you have earned Tote 'n Chip)
- Flashlight/head lamp & extra batteries (keep easily accessible in backpack)
- Chair (optional)

Not well understood fact: The temperature rating for your sleeping bag is intended as a minimum temperature for you to safely survive – not a rating for your comfortable snoozing. Bring a blanket, too.

Cottonwood Trail - Blaze Color: Dark Blue


The Cottonwood Trail is a 2.3 mile round trip hike. The easy, multi-use trail is accessible from the Massanutten Shelter Parking area. In addition, the Primitive Campground has a separate access point to the trail for registered campers. The trail passes through a wooded area before you reach the boardwalk loop that circles through a wetland area with vernal pools. This quiet corner of the park offers great opportunities for spotting wildlife. Several other trails, including Wildcat Ledge, Point and Allen's Mountain, can be accessed from this trail.

Allen's Mountain Trail - Blaze Color: Silver


The Allen's Mountain Trail is a 3.2 mile moderate difficulty trail for hiking and biking. The trail weaves through wooded, mountainous terrain, taking users to the highest point in the park on Allen's Mountain. The Campbell's Jump trail can be accessed from Allen's Mountain to offer a shorter hike for those that do not wish to traverse the summit. **This trail is accessible from the Cottonwood Trail** that begins at the Massanutten Shelter parking area.

Point Trail - Blaze Color: Gold


The Point Trail is a 2.2 mile, moderate difficulty trail for hiking and biking that is **accessible from the Cottonwood Trail in two locations**. This quiet and serene trail climbs through hardwood forest and experiences several changes in elevation as it weaves through ravines and hilly terrain.

Wildcat Ledge Trail - Blaze Color: Beige


The Wildcat Ledge Trail is a .2 mile, difficult hiking trail that is accessible from the Cottonwood Trail boardwalk. The trail takes hikers and bikers up a very steep, rocky slope that eventually levels out for a little while before one last rocky, steep incline at the top of the ledge. At this point there is a spectacular view of the river, fields and mountains that surround the area. This point is near the park boundary which is marked by a fence.

Bear Bottom Loop Trail - Blaze Color: Teal

Bear Bottom Loop Trail is a 5.4 mile round trip, difficult, multi-use trail. This trail begins at the horse trailer parking area and roughly follows the topographic contour lines skirting beautiful creek bed hollows. Big Oak Trail can be accessed about half way through the loop. The upper portion offers scenic winter views of the Massanutten Mountains. Black bear and deer have been observed in this area. The switchbacks that follow the terrain make this trail feel like a real walk in the wilderness. While this is one of the most enjoyable trails in the park, hikers should allow 2 to 3 hours to complete the trail and be sure to take plenty of water
